Adequan USDF FEI-Level Trainers' Conference

January 16 – 17, 2023

This past week I had the pleasure and privilege of attending the USDF FEI Trainers Conference for the first time. I had been invited before (qualifying as a judge, since the last time I had shown FEI level was before this conference existed!) but hadn't wanted to spend the travel money or take the time off from work.

What tipped the scales this year was that my best childhood friend Marcy Brooks now lives 45 min. from the conference venue – the amazingly beautiful High Meadow Farm in Loxahatchee, FL. Marcy is a rider and trainer, but did not qualify for an invitation. Fortunately, each of the invitees is allowed to bring a guest. The clincher was that the first day of the conference was Marcy's birthday! Registrations were completed, plane ticket bought, and the learning began.

Supervisory Panel - though I would have liked to have heard more from Linda Zang and Lilo Fore. There were 8 demo riders who each received a roughly 45 minute lesson each day from the 2 remaining panelists — David Hunt of Great Britain and Henk van Bergen from the Netherlands. David and Henk alternated lessons, but ended up working with the same rider/horse combo both days. We agreed we would have liked to have seen them switch up the instructor/rider pairings. But the training messages were so consistent across all the rides that it may not have mattered.

What we saw demonstrated over and over is that it is the basics that matter. If the horse is not moving sharply off the leg, but without running through the seat and hands, none of the FEI movements will be correct. Passage, for example, is just a compression of the trot. If the horse doesn't trot up to the hand, then accept the containment of the seat and hands, there is no passage.

We had a variety of demonstration horses, with several large, extravagant warmbloods, of course, but also a German Riding Pony, a less extravagant but very correct KWPN, and a PRE stallion. With 300 attendees it was the largest conference to date, and the atmosphere was scary for some of the horses, at least to start.

Bits and Pieces

Corrections: Don't punish un-asked-for flying changes. Or if a horse breaks to canter from trot, don't bring it right back, but go with the forward impulse of the horse for a few moments. Piaffe steps are a "present" even if you didn't ask for them, so don't be too quick to stop!

We saw many times round the arena walk-trot-walk transitions, without pulling on the reins for the down transition, but not throwing them away on the up. Also, many walk-halt-walk transitions, prompt to leg without running away from it (especially the hot horses, of which there were several – see above re largest conference ever!).

Leg yield was used frequently as a suppling exercise (yes – even at FEI), with steep sideways ones to back off an overenthusiastic horse. (Kathy uses these with Roxann and me to great effect for the opposite reason – to get Roxy's hind legs under and snapping up).

Exercises

(Lilo Fore) Flying changes on a 20 m circle – Zang reminding that counter canter is a straightening exercise.

(van Bergen) Serpentine width of the arena (we think of 3 loops from 2nd level, but this being FEI Henk went with 6 loops) with a few steps of half pass on crossing center line each time

(Hunt) Canter a 5m circle, being sure to return to the *exact* same starting point, then do it again in haunches in. This was effective in keeping the canter active for some who slowed too much in preparing the pirouette.

(Zang) Ride horse up to outside rein, then use outside aids to bring outside shoulder in. Don't drop into inside hip and lift outside hip. We saw shoulder in used over and over in many exercises and combinations – i.e. shoulder in on track then start short diagonal straight for a few meters; 10m ½ circle opposite way to track, and repeat.

Quotes

"It's your trot (walk, canter), not the horse's" David Hunt reminding us to set the tempo.

"The best reward is to stop the exercise" Henk suggesting patting the horse while letting it come out of piaffe rather than rewarding while making it keep going.

"Everything you do must *not* take away from the horse's basic gaits" David's overall theme on not holding horses in, but releasing them to come through, while "meeting them there".

"Progress happens on the edge" Henk on pushing gait almost to loss of balance, etc.

"Come out of (the canter pirouette exercise) without letting me see you're coming out of it" David on keeping the same canter before, during, and after the pirouette.

"Demonstrate basics, not tricks" Henk reminding us that quality of gaits is paramount.



Dressage Rule Changes Effective February 1, 2023

USEF Dressage has several rule changes which were approved by the Board of Directors and will take effect February 1, 2023. Among the rule changes are the following:

DR120 Dress: A tailcoat is permitted in all classes above Fourth level, in the FEI test for 7-year-old horses, and in tests for FEI Juniors.

DR121 Saddlery and Equipment: Either a snaffle bridle or double bridle is permitted for USEF High Performance and USEF Young Adult qualifying classes held at a national competition.

DR121 Saddlery and Equipment: Bits. A bridoon bit and a curb bit must be made of metal or *durable* plastic, *flexible rubber or synthetic material* and may be covered with rubber (in manufactured state).

DR122 Execution and Judging of Tests: In the event that the horse starts to defecate or urinate after the judge rang the bell but before the start of the test, the clock will be stopped until the horse is ready to continue at which point the clock will be restarted.

DR122 Execution and Judging of Tests: The FEI Tests for 7-Year-Old Horses cannot be offered in a Young Horse Test of Choice (TOC) class. When more than one judge officiates, the technical score and the quality score shall be weighted each with 50% towards the final score.

DR129 Musical Freestyle Ride: Language added to clarify the breaking of a tie. The higher artistic score shall determine the winner. Should the artistic mark be the same, the higher mark for harmony will decide. If still tied the higher mark for choreography will decide.

FEI Para Dressage Test Name Changes: Para Dressage test names have been updated to reflect the changes made by the FEI. Please note: the tests remain the same, only the names have changed.

Learning our ABCs with Carol Bishop!

It is largely in part to being granted a scholarship through SVDA that I started participating in clinics with Carol Bishop in Spring of 2021. Taking advantage of this opportunity has changed my horse and my riding forever! We will never be the same again, thank goodness!

In case you don't know Carol, she is committed, dedicated and very passionate about Classical Dressage, correctness, balance and harmony between horse and rider. She is a USDF "R" Judge and WDAA "R" Judge. She has traveled throughout the US, Spain, Portugal and Germany training with Dressage greats, Karl Mikolka, chief rider of the Spanish Riding School, coach to the Brazilian Olympic team, Reiner Klimke, Olympic Gold and Bronze Medalist, and Col Bengt Ljungquist, USA Olympic Team Coach as well as Nuno Oliveira, whose teachings inspired the teaching and training of the "baroque" (classical) style of working a horse, an artform dating back hundreds of years and incorporated into today's dressage.

Luckily Carol also travels monthly to Hampton Roads to work with students who strive to learn her craft. I am thrilled to say that I have been included in this group!

Carol's philosophy in working with horse and rider is to find gaps and fix them! She takes time to learn how each student's brain works, how the horses' brain works and believes missing pieces create a lack of confidence! Lack of confidence relates to a lack of the basics. If the basics are missing - GO BACK AND GET THEM!

Carol also believes in training the trainer! You are the trainer. When you are alone, one of you is being trained. She does not keep secrets of riding to herself, she shares them so you can train your horse when she is not around and also

gives you a solid understanding of dressage, what it means, what it is, why you are doing what you are doing and more specifically HOW to do it.

So...we went back to get what we were missing. We started with the letter A! Then B...then C....and finally we started forming words and then sentences....and then back to A or B or C or A and B or C and so on if we lost our place... and so on until we were able to advance together with a solid understanding and the skills needed to perform basic functions before moving to the next-on both our parts! I understand, Athena understands, and Athena understands that I understand!

What are A, Bs and Cs.you ask? The ability to manage your horse's body starting with the shoulders, controlling the steering, dictating tempo and circumference, gaining balance laterally and longitudinally, communicating effectively with the hind while developing suppleness and a soft back without forcing the horse into a frame or holding them in place. In addition, sentences involve gaining an understanding of how to correctly ask to get your desired result with each step with proper use of seat and aids.

This was not a fast process, the method requires patience! This is not a sprint to get to the next step, it is a foundation to build upon gradually as learning takes time! Relearning also takes time! We do a lot of ground work! Does your horse understand before you mount what you will be asking for today? Do you know what horse you have today and will he/she be ready to answer when you ask? If not, wait, work through it and then become a team. Carol has guided us through a process of understanding PRIOR to leaving the stall and PRIOR to mounting. Gaining balance and acceptance PRIOR climbing aboard and, therefore, creating more successful partnership and learning experience in every ride. Ground work was never part of our routine but flying around on the end of a lunge line like a horse kite was...gone are those days thankfully! The answer used to be NO, now the answer is mostly, "what are you looking for today Mom?"

I can truly attest that our lessons learned, although patient and methodical, have been rewarding and made a large difference for us as we learn together and work together! We still have great days and our not so great days, but what is 100% different is that I now know how to handle challenges and overcome them from one ride to the next confidently! What I don't know yet will come in my next lesson!

In summary, if you are not getting what you are looking for or you want to improve your results, perhaps you might want to join our little group. If you want to try a new trainer and/or clinician, take the time to apply for a scholarship to help offset the cost a little, it could change your life too!

2023 Purple Book: Chapters need to submit their information by January 25th to Alison Douglas and Sheli King. This will be the last hard copy of the book.

Shel Gafford Award: Two nominees have been sent out to chapters who need to send Chapter result to Sheli King.

GAIG Regional Survey Form: Diane reported that the management team got excellent reviews. Issues concerning participants were the disparity between the indoor and outdoor arena footing, some facility issues (which are pretty much out of our control), and the night classes running late (only solution would be to limit the number of open class entries). AOB: Sheli wants to have a big name clinic in 2024. We need feedback for clinicians and venues. The VHC and Old Raptor Farm were mentioned. Lisa Powers brought up the IEA will be having their equitation finals March 11th at Liberty University. Levels don't go above 1st. They need loaner horses and saddles (23 saddles). 
