Old Business: Motion to approve May 9th minutes and seconded.

VADA Rep(Robyn):

- The DAL show was a success with 202 horses and almost 400 entries. No word yet on the financials of this show.
- The R1 Youth Team Championships in Fredericksburg, was well supported with riders. After some discussion otherwise, I believe this show will continue at Rosemount in 2025.
- GAIGS October 10 13, also in Lexington
- SVDA did not sponsor anything at DAL and is assumed will not sponsor anything for GAIGS. At this point, the VADA treasury is much healthier than SVDA's.
- Lilo Fore clinic is planned for spring 2025 in Lexington. VADA will once again sponsor team jackets for the NAYJRC R1 teams. There has been some discussion of making a large donation to the VA Horse Center for continued facility improvements, as well as making a \$500 donation to the R1 Youth Team Championships.
- There still remains a few openings for the L Grad program.

President (Cookie):

- Seahorse show for July 28th is cancelled due to rain. Laura Gladden is going to try and reschedule.
- Due to SVDA's treasury being so low a post was placed for an online auction. A few items have been received for the auction but if anyone has items they would like to donate please contact Cookie.
- The proceeds from the Seahorse show will go to the juniors as they are working the show. Entries are very low so there is a concern as to how much the profit will be.

Vice President (Beth):

- Will cancel the insurance for the July28th show due to cancellation.

Treasurer (Shari):

- Current balance is \$11,555.72 as of 23 July 2023.

Secretary (Deb):

- Minutes were posted in the Half Halt Newsletter

Membership (Susan):

- Memberships continue to be submitted but at a much slower pace than at the beginning of the year. The vast majority of the members have been using the online payment option rather than submitting checks.
- Continuing to work with Nancy Doody and VADA to ensure the information being submitted on behalf of SVDA is accurate and correct format. I also am working with Nancy on the electronic version of VADA's "purple book."

Scholarships (Whitney):

- No one has used any of the scholarship funds for this year to date.

- Six out of seven riders attended the Region 1 Youth Team Challenge. One horse had a fracture and there was no substitute. This occurred after the closing date so there was no refund.



Rider Responsibilities and Roadblocks in the Debbie Rodriguez Clinic, by

VADA/Nova's Debbie Rodriquez Clinic was held at beautiful Windswept Farm. It started with brief illumination from the sun before fleeing into the spacious indoor due to the rain. However, the rays of light continued to shine as each rider stepped through Debbie's method of discovering their partnership in a new light. Debbie listened to each rider on where she struggled, but had everyone start in walk. Lower-level horses tended to perform leg yield to a halt and then a turn on the forehand. The walk was eliminated after several repetitions. More advanced horses started in "baby" half pass to turn on haunches. "Baby" half passes have no leg crossing and serve to loosen up the horse and encourage forward motion. A few horses were nervous and so Debbie had them walk figures to relax and focus the mind. One horse walked a 10-meter circle at each letter to focus his thoughts so his body could relax.

Why such a slow start? Debbie explained she was looking for losses of balance and the rider's coordination of aids in response to the loss of balance or lack of flexion or bend. Next steps were exercises to strengthen the weak limb or fix the loss of balance. A neck strap was used for a few people to be conscious of their hands and for a young horse that wanted to chest dive. Half halting with the neck strap first, helped a mare understand the request and be more responsive to the bit aid. All riders were reminded to keep our upright balance and be purposeful with the aids. Most riders mentioned uneven rein contact and stiffness as being something they wanted to correct. Debbie reminded riders to use personal phrasing when speaking about their horse and Roadblocks in their minds. Instead of saying "he's locked on the bit and won't flex," she said to remember, "I need to flex the horse and release versus pulling my horse."

"Lubricating the ball joint between their ears," was commonly mentioned. She also emphasized correcting and moving past it, saying we should give an aid and expect a response, even if the response given isn't our goal, but it's part of the journey.

After warm up, the exercises diverged greatly. Balance, correct aids, and feeling for the horses' response were firmly put into Rider Responsibilities! Debbie quietly, but firmly, insisted each rider move past the Roadblock. For some it was pushing for more sit in the canter or trot, which felt awkward as the horse fumbled to figure out the steps and trust its strength. Haunches-in on a circle, and performing two steps of walk or canter pirouette at A, E, C, B to form a diamond were a favored exercise for strengthening horse. For several, getting flexion or bend and not letting the horse dictate when or where was a huge Roadblock. One mare would threaten to kick out or bounce in place, another gelding just stood like a statue. Debbie shouted with encouragement, "it's my rein, I decide what to do with it, sucker," emboldening the rider to not release that rein and to displace the horse's haunches as they had been shown. The opposite rein was allowed, but how much depended on the circumstances. Both horses were better the following day with this straightforward technique and, "letting the moment fall behind you." Switching between lateral movements and the diamond exercise described above became building blocks versus Roadblocks. The "my rein" phrase rang out encouraging rider to be bold, but fair.

Pairs not ready for diamond exercise found purpose in creating a steady tempo and consistent stride on the 20-meter circle. Getting six strides for every quarter of a circle is harder than it seems when the horse is distracted or tense. Taking this tempo to the rail and maintaining it throughout lateral movements or changes of direction highlight the foundation, which must be laid no matter the location. I found it easier to maintain my suddenly tense, distracted "Barbie" palomino by bringing my elbows close and using my leg to insist on maintaining direction and tempo. At shows, I can become a distraction and he can tune me out when I get busy and compromise my Rider Responsibilities. The circle was used by all as a tempo and stride check the second day. Some even to the tune of a metronome! Watching one combination gain uphill push while collecting and extending to the same beat highlighted the importance of the exercise - six strides per quarter circle. It all builds from this foundation and watching Debbie use the same tools in various ways was enlightening and encouraging.

I enjoyed the positivity and expectation from Debbie to, "school your horse like perfection is possible." She agreed that compromises may have to be made at competitions to give the horse courage and mileage. However, when schooling, she encouraged each rider to ride a few more repetitions of the exercise as we feel it improving to encourage ourselves and our horse to reach for more. When schooling, flexion can be adjusted during a movement to encourage balance and stop the stiffening just as we may combine half pass to leg yield or forward motion to a halt to preserve balance.

Finally, I realized I seldom audit clinics. However, as I was taking photos and waiting for my ride toward the end of the day, I realized I was absorbing a lot of valuable tools and mindset that Debbie Rodriguez brings to her clinic. There was no speaker so we couldn't hear every word but that kept us focused too. In between riders, Debbie would ask if we had questions and thoughtfully answer. Balance is now in the spotlight for me and knowing I will remember Debbie and her purposeful movements as I dance with my horse each ride.

VADA BOARD MEETING MINUTES 7-31-24 VIA ZOOM

Participating: Sheli King (VN); Tina Longaker (C'ville); Jessie Ginsburg (NOVA); Alison Douglas (Central); Robyn Nunnally (SVDA); Nancy Doody (C'ville); Rachel Rice (NOVA); Christina Arrington (Central); Muffin Smith (SWVADA); Sandy Toby (SVDA); Anne Draine (NE); Eleszabeth McNeel (C'ville) and member Dianne Boyd

Minutes: The minutes from the June meeting were approved by unanimous consent.

Treasurer's Report: Jessie reported that the combined balances are \$219,383. This includes deposits for the L program but no expenses.

Membership Report: We currently have 580 members with USDF.

DAL: We lost about \$3100 this year but that's much better than the \$15,000 we lost last year with about the same size show. We saved money with the competitor party and purchasing our own breakfast treats and having a volunteer drive the breakfast cart. We also raised some class fees. A couple of things that we'll be looking at before next year are to try to get the SHAC program sponsored and taking a look at the financials on the breed show- is it making money. Dianne reported that the show ran well- we dealt with the heat by having water at every ring. We had good participation in the challenge classes as well as SHAC. The social media campaign helped.

On-line Educational Dentistry Clinic: Dr. True will be holding the zoom clinic on August 7th at 8pm. The format will be 50 minutes of lecture followed by a question-and-answer period. Signup is available on the website. We currently have 17 people signed up. If this type of program is well received, we can work on some ideas for next year.

Annual GMO Awards: We had two submissions. The board decided to nominate both for different categories for newsletter awards.

Charitable Donations/Sponsorships: Sheli attended Carter Bass' memorial service and reported that the family identified the Dressage Foundation as their choice for donations. Jessie made a motion, seconded by Rachel, that VADA make a \$500 donation in honor of Carter. The motion passed unanimously.

Lending Library: Patty Howell, from the Central Chapter, reached out to Nancy Doody with the idea to make the lending library that she runs for Central open to all VADA members. In exchange for volunteer hours, she will absorb the cost of shipping books to those requesting. Some books need to be returned, some do not, and some are rare books that are for review only in person. Nancy will work with Patty to create an online form.

L Program Update: Kat has filled 29 of the 30 slots for participants. She is researching a hotel with a classroom area that is feasible. The format will be one day farm and one day classroom.
